## Jamboree Flash Update

Safe from Harm (Youth Protection) training will be available on line soon for every adult attending the Jamboree to take.

As with all Scouting events the safety and security of youth and adults is of the highest concern, so the World Scout Jamboree will be providing "Safe from Harm" training that will be required for all adults before they can participate in 24<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree. This training will also be required of all people working on the site in support of the Jamboree.

Training is online and when finished you will be able to print a certificate of completion to verify that you have taken the course. Please bring this with you to the Jamboree as evidence your training has been completed.

An online training Safe from Harm will be an interactive training with several modules that are designed to assist with some of the following areas.

- Overall introduction to Safe from Harm
  - Overview for the Jamboree and discussing many of the things that everyone needs to be aware of when involved in an event of this size.
- Abuse and Discrimination
  - o Talks about several things that may happen and what is considered unacceptable behavior.
- Cyber Security
  - In today's world we all must be vigilant about what is said and done in the electronic world of Social Media.
- Working Safely with Others
  - If you are involved in activities you will receive training in how to carry them out safely, with appropriate Personal Protective Equipment. This module covers how to stay safe when dealing with other people at the Jamboree.
- Mental Health
  - o In this module we explore why Mental Health is a Safe from Harm issue at the Jamboree, how to look after your own Mental Health, and how to look out for others.
- Responding to Incidents
  - How to get expert help and support if something goes wrong and how to help yourself.
- Respecting Differences/Cultural Awareness
  - Many backgrounds, identities, cultures, religions, countries, and contingents' cultures come
    together at the Jamboree. Some have different ways of behaving and looking at the world –
    different values and norms. What we do in such a large and diverse environment will affect other
    people, including people whose values and norms are different from ours. It is important to
    understand those differences and respect them.

<ul> <li>This module deals with how we do things at the Jamboree. How we do things is governed by the Jamboree's policies and Code of Conduct and by local law.</li> </ul>
